

girl, she always had plenty of questions for our staff. She wanted to know about the big questions facing adolescents. Growing


only in 9th grade, but she's already taking Advanced Placement courses! She counts on the Club to get help with her homework and to get the computer access she needs in order to complete homework that requires

The Boys & Girls Club is here for kids year round – whenever there's no school, the Club's doors are open to welcome the kids. That's been especially important this school year. In the Ocean View School District, three schools have closed their doors temporarily due to problems with asbestos and fire safety. Oak View, Lake View and Hope View schools are all closed for months as they work hard to repair the problems and make the schools safe for the kids. During that time, kids are being bused to other schools, some as far away as Buena Park. It's hard for kids and parents to handle such a major disruption. Oak View kids are now on a much later bus pick up schedule to go to their new temporary school. That makes it a challenge for moms and dads to

get to work on time. So, the Club is extending a helping hand to families by extending its hours. For the duration of the school closures, we're offering a new before school program at our Oak View Branch. Kids now have a safe, supervised place to stay before they catch the bus to their new school. 50 kids are taking advantage of this new service. That means 50 moms and dads can keep their jobs and 50 kids are safe and not hanging out on the

street corners in gang territory. When many things are uncertain in their lives, kids know they can count on the Boys & Girls Club to always be there to help.

And, it's not just in special circumstances that we're open when school's out. The Club's doors are open every day after school, during winter break, spring break, most school holidays and all of summer. Families in



Huntington Beach and Fountain Valley can count on the Boys & Girls Club day in and day out. The Club's long hours mean moms and dads can work to provide for their families while kids can extend their learning or just have some fun. A mom named Oliva says, "I need to

work to support my kids to provide food, clothes, books for school, pay bills, and meet all their needs. But the most important thing is to keep my little daughter in the

Club Launches New Math Explorers Program

For many students, math can be a scary subject. In the Fountain Valley School District, most kids start out doing really well in math. In second grade, about 90% of kids are on target in their math skills. But, by the time kids get to the 7th grade, about one out of every three kids is not "proficient" in math, according to annual STAR tests. The Club is working hard to help kids in the middle grades change their attitudes about math and have a chance to practice those important math skills. With help from Time Warner Foundation, we launched the Math Explorers Club this fall at our Kingston Branch to re-engage kids in math.

Using curriculum materials specially designed for kids' out of school time, the Club's Math Explorers

program is getting kids in grades 4-8 excited about math. Kids in grades 6-8 use the "Math Explorer" curriculum. It makes learning fun with hands on projects. Kids get to use their math skills for challenges like flying planes and launching rockets. Younger kids in grades 4-6 use the KidzMath curriculum.

Valerie, a Club member from Kingston, would like to tell you more about her experience with KidzMath. "Every Friday, I come straight to the Club from school. I get ready to play fun math games," says Valerie.

"We've played three games so far. The first game helped us work on our subtraction, and the second game helped us work on addition. We are also going over



subtraction and addition in my math class at school right now. So, the math games are helping me do better on my quizzes at school. The third game we played is my favorite. It's called 'Guess a Number.' I got to think of a number, and my partner asked me a bunch of questions to see if she could guess the number I picked. When it was my turn, I asked her questions like, 'Is this number small or large? Is it even or odd?'

In the end, I guessed the number correctly!" Valerie is a 4th grader. She loves math and looks forward to participating in KidzMath every week.

> Number games like "Guess a Number" do more than foster kids' number sense. They help children make decisions, be responsible for their learning, and work together with their peers. Quality programs like KidzMath and Math Explorer help prepare our kids for success in the future. Closing off math today means closing off many potential career paths in the future. Bridging the Digital Divide

Surf City Rotary and Boys & Girls Club Team Up to Make Computers and Khan Academy Available for Kids in Need

Did you read about Giselle in our article about how you helped a struggling youth become a star student? If you did, you know that there are lots of kids at the Club who don't have a home computer. Many of us assume that everyone has internet access these days. However, it's just not true. There is still a great "Digital Divide" between the poor and the affluent. With 70% of Club members coming from low-income families, more than 1,000 children at our Clubs have no Internet access at all. Many more only have Internet access on their mom or dad's cell phone. This is a major issue for

a lot of kids. Many classes require typed homework or Internet research. For more affluent kids, that's no problem. But, imagine what it must be like to be a 9th grader like Giselle trying to do well in school. How do you do it without the Internet or even a keyboard at your fingertips? That's where the Club comes in. We fill an important gap for the 1,000+ kids who need technology access. Kids can use computer labs at all of our branches. Even our preschool classrooms are equipped with computers so that our youngest members gain experience in technology.

This fall, the Club partnered with Surf City Rotary Club and the Brenden Mann Foundation to expand technology access and education for the kids at the Club. Surf City Rotary generously donated



Huntington Beach and Fountain Valley branches! These brand new laptops are dedicated to linking youth to the Khan Academy. Khan Academy is a website that features thousands of educational tutorials on subjects like math, chemistry, biology, art, and much more! Each tutorial has videos and activities designed to be fun and appealing to kids. A grant from the Brenden Mann Foundation helps fund staff to guide kids through the concepts they're learning online and help youth complete related activities offline. This new program helps kids at all levels. Kids struggling in school get the extra support they need to succeed. Gifted kids can take their learning a step beyond their classroom learning. And, every kid can explore
